I. CALL TO ORDER

Mr. Boone called the Regular Meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. He welcomed everyone in attendance as well as those watching via live streaming or television and thanked them for their interest in public education.

2. Stellar Employee of the Month

The Superintendent made the following announcement: It is my pleasure this evening to announce the Stellar Employee for the month of January is Carrie Wood. Carrie Wood is a kindergarten teacher at Pleasant Grove Elementary. Carrie has been at Pleasant Grove for 12 years and with the District

for 14 years. Mrs. Wood is much more than just a teacher at Pleasant Grove. She works with specialneeds students to help them become successful in the general education classroom. Mrs. Wood is a cheerleader for Pleasant Grove and continually assists her coworkers, both professionally and personally. Mrs. Wood goes above and beyond. PBIS Model School Awards
